Dear U.S. National Committee for UN Women,

Within the last 12 months, the critical role that women play in securing sustainable peace

and equitable development has continued to move to the forefront and has even made the headlines. We all cheered in October when the Nobel Committee awarded the Nobel Peace Prize to 3 women who worked to protect women during violent uprisings and to ensure their full participation in peace-building. On International Women's Day this year, the UN Secretary General and the President of the General Assembly formally proposed the convening of a 5th World Conference on Women (5WCW) in 2015. Crowning years of work by women's groups and activists, their call for member nations to support a conference is a further recognition of "the importance and relevance of women's issues for global progress. (Ki-moon, 2012)"

USNC-UN Women is engaged with both achievements. The Metro NY chapter recently welcomed Leymah Gbowee, one of the Peace Prize laureates, at an evening reception where Ms. Gbowee inspired the audience with her call to action to stand up on behalf of women and human rights in all communities (please see related article). The San Francisco chapter continues to be a very active partner in the 5WCW coalition. After working hand-in-hand with other women's organizations to secure support for the conference, the chapter and national board members are now striving to have San Francisco, birthplace of the UN, named as the host city.

This nationwide activity comes naturally for USNC-UN Women, as we are the voice within the US for women worldwide. Our chapters and members work within their communities to engage Americans in global women's issues, from human trafficking to increased political participation, and to inform them of the crucial work that UN Women does to support women's rights. Our annual conference on June 2 in Washington, DC will continue this trend, as we gather to discuss women's leadership in politics, civil society, and peacebuilding. Please join us in this unique opportunity to engage experts in leadership and global peacebuilding about progress already made and progress that has yet to be secured.

In January, UN Women commemorated its first anniversary. Over the course of the year, a clear vision has been articulated and a

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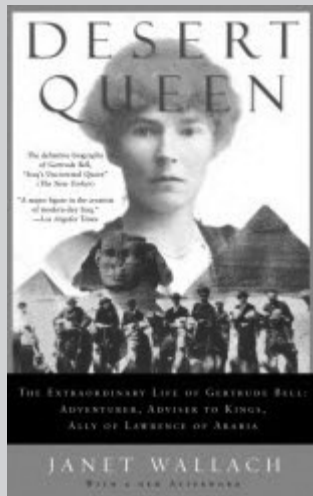
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Book Review

Desert Queen by Janet Wallach



This biography of Gertrude Bell, a Victorian woman who explored, mapped and excavated the Arab world, is crammed with historical details. Wallach's scholarly research is edifying, but may become tedious for some. Gertrude Bell who, as a wealthy, educated Victorian woman, felt entitled and empowered to conduct her daring adventures among Arab desert tribes, as well as alongside world colonial leaders who presumed to decide the fate of that part of the world as a part of the British colonization.

Although she was a liberated feminist, Bell did not support women's suffrage, convinced that women of the lower classes could not understand their countries' politics. Bell herself was the object of ridicule among her male peers. She fought to attain decision-making power, feeling like "a Person" whenever she overcame her adversaries.

An accomplished archaeologist, she uncovered many treasures from ancient Arabia and was also a consummate athlete, who scaled the highest peaks of the Swiss Alps. A photo shows her at the Cairo conference in 1921, the only woman in the company of Winston Churchill, T.E. Lawrence, Sir Percy Cox, and other world powers of the day.

Subsequently, she gradually saw the imperial conquests in Arabia disintegrate, as people demanded independence. Discouraged and depressed, she ended up taking too many sleeping pills, and never woke up. She is not well known in the lands that she loved, in spite of her incredible presence there. As one Arab sheikh remarked, "If this is what the women of England are like, their men must be lions."

Strategic Plan has been endorsed by the Executive Board during its first annual session and is now being implemented.

I would like to reiterate that like UN Women itself, National Committees now have to think and act on a larger scale within your respective countries so that together we can achieve our ambitious vision and mandate in support of women. Despite all the support that we have received in our first year, we must realize that we live in a time of austerity, of shrinking budgets and increased scrutiny on the way we use the little money we have. We cannot ignore this reality and continue to do business as usual. We can also understand how difficult it must be for National Committees to operate in this environment.

We count on National Committees to strengthen outreach in your respective countries, as many still have to translate their enthusiasm for UN Women into a financial commitment. We need to join forces where UN Women also makes a stronger case in support of National Committees when communicating with your respective governments, whether it is to facilitate a tax-exemption status or funding operational work of National Committees.

We are increasing our capacity to manage the partnership with National Committees with greater communication tools and resources on advocacy and fundraising. In moving forward with the partnership, we understand that change will take time, which is why we need to set both incremental targets and longer term goals reflecting our larger vision. But we must also look further than ourselves and promote investment in gender equality and women's empowerment in general and work in partnership with governments, civil society, the private sector and universities to promote the goals. UN Women's biggest impact will not come from programs that we run ourselves but from influencing others, leveraging results and using small resources to catalyze big changes."

Metro New York Chapter Hosts Nobel Peace Laureate

The Metro NY chapter was thrilled to host an evening with Nobel Peace Laureate Leymah Gbowee, who along with Ellen Johnson Sirleaf and Tawakkul Karman, was awarded the 2011 Nobel Peace Prize "for their non-violent struggle for the safety of women and for women's rights to full participation in peace-building work." Leymah Gbowee is the executive director of the *Women Peace and Security Network Africa*, which builds relationships across the West African sub-region in support of women's capacity to prevent, avert, and end conflicts. She is a founding member and former coordinator of the Women in Peacebuilding Program/West African Network for Peacebuilding (WIPNET/



WANEP). She also served as the commissioner-designate for the Liberia Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

Abigail Disney, Producer of *Pray the Devil Back to Hell* and the *Women, War, and Peace* series, introduced Ms. Gbowee, who thoroughly captivated and inspired everyone in the audience. Ms. Gbowee urged everyone to take action in our own communities to advance women's equality and stand up to injustices, echoing this message in her book, "...I believe, I know, that if you have unshakable faith in yourself, in your sisters and in the possibility of change, you can do almost anything."

Sponsored by Bank of America, the event was held on March 13, 2012, in their new corporate offices at Bryant Park in NYC. Attendees had the opportunity to meet Ms. Gbowee during a wine reception, where she graciously signed copies of her book *Mighty Be Our Powers: How Sisterhood, Prayer, and Sex Changed a Nation at War*.
